

LETTER FROM THE PRIORESS

Be of Good Zeal

St. Benedict warned us in his Rule, written in the 6th century, of two different ways of acting, "Just as there is a wicked zeal of bitterness which separates from God..., so there is a good zeal which separates from evil and leads to

God and everlasting life."(Ch. 72.1)

The bitter zeal of the people who committed random, deadly shootings, this year alone, in Las Vegas, Rancho Tehama, and closer to home in Sutherland Springs, Texas, has shaken the depths of our very souls. I found myself numb during all the reporting of these tragedies.

These acts of violence have brought up questions for me. What is missing in the lives of the people who do these killings, what drives them to take the lives of innocent people they do not even know, and why kill children and babies? What is missing in our society and in our laws that enables a person to take the life of another person in such violent ways? Why are movies and video games created to glorify violence and pollute the minds of those who partake in their evil zeal? And where is the will to act on the issue of gun violence? We hear, "now is not the time." When will it be the time? What can I/we do?

I am drawn back to what Benedict says, "This, then is the good zeal which monks must foster with fervent love: They should each try to be the first to show respect to the other, supporting with the greatest patience one another's weaknesses of body or behavior." The week following the Sutherland Springs tragedy we heard story after story of the faith of the people affected and of compassionate people reaching out to this community.

Something I heard several times in the news reporting these past weeks was people saying to one another, "Go home and hug the people you love." It was another way of saying what Benedict said so long ago; show respect, support one another, love your neighbor. What we model at home has many ramifications in society, for good or for evil.

As I review the contents of our newsletter, I am filled with admiration for our sisters who pour themselves out in their ministries which bring about so much good, each in its own unique way. A special thank you to all who support our work through your gifts of time, talent, and treasure.

I am amazed that this is Omega Retreat Center's 35th anniversary! I am very grateful that it is here to offer a place, particularly in these uncertain times, for groups to "come away for a little while," to reflect, to heal, and to share with others who journey with them in life. As they end their stay, may their time here edify good zeal, and help them to go forth to make the world more peaceful and safe.

It is my hope that this Advent offers you time and space for your own reflection, your own deepening on the Mystery that we will celebrate this Christmas, the mystery of God's eternal love for us and the mystery of Jesus who came to show us the way to live with one another.

Though autonomous, the Benedictine Sisters are one of twenty Monasteries of Benedictine women that comprise the Federation of St. Scholastica. Elected representatives from various communities serve on the Council of the Federation. One of the ways the Federation serves its members is to conduct a Visitation every six years. As explained on the Federation's website, "Through the visitation of its member monasteries, the Federation of St. Scholastica provides a structure by which a community evaluates the authenticity of its lived experience of the Rule of Benedict and the federation's constitution, Call to Life (CN 8). The visitation of member monasteries is a means of offering support, advice, correction, exchange of ideas and direction. The entire process is meant to foster hope and the development of a clear community-supported direction for the future" (www.federationofsaintscholastica.org).


This year was our year for Visitation. During the past several months, we have engaged in a self-study and gathered information to present to the visiting team. Federation President, Sister Lynn Marie McKenzie, OSB from Sacred Heart Monastery in Cullman, AL, and Federation First Councilor, Sister Susan Quaintance, OSB from St. Scholastica Monastery in Chicago, IL were here Nov. 9 - 12 for our Visitation. Congratulations Faithful Servant

A Reflection on Omega's 35 Years of Benedictine Spirituality and Hospitality

His name is Paul. In the evenings he sometimes relaxes on a bench outside the Omega Retreat Center office. I once asked him if he would like to move to a quieter location with a better view, just down the hill in the St. Francis outdoor chapel. Paul said no. He liked the peace where he was, and the view was just fine.

This isn't an unusual reaction from those who have frequented the grounds of the Omega Retreat Center these past thirty-five years. The peace and the view are just fine, but there's so much more to Omega, which has been referred to over the years as "Holy Ground." Those of us who work here claim it is simply our task to "create/hold this space so that those who come can see and act upon the movement of the Spirit" (anonymous).

When asked for his impression of Omega and its significance as a retreat center, Andrew Anderson, Omega's previous Program Coordinator and Director from 1989-2012, shared the following:

"Omega provides an environment and presence of Benedictine hospitality, serenity, and prayer that enables individuals to reflect on the Word of God, deepen their prayer life and achieve an epiphany of spirit, all while providing an experience of spiritual renewal and inner healing/growth in loving relationships with God and all people.'

He continued, "Omega is an empowering experience - spiritually, emotionally and physically. Lives are transformed, emotional wounds healed, love experienced, companionships nourished, and faith restored. People experience Christ's touch, and they are never the same.

Through the retreat center's doors pass the disenfranchised and those intact, the broken and the healthy, those alienated and those united, the gifted and the inept. There are Catholic, Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, Episcopalian, Lutheran and interdenominational guests. Those who come are touched by the staff's commitment to ensuring that: All guests who present themselves are to be welcomed as Christ. (RB: Chapter 53).

"Hospitality means more than serving a meal, opening a door, or offering a bed. It means opening our hearts to others." Dorothy Day

The commitment of our staff to receive all guests as Christ, to open their hearts to others, and to care for all that has been entrusted to them, as sacred vessels of the altar, creates an atmosphere of Benedictine presence. That Benedictine presence allows people to be transformed and shaped by the potter - hearts are touched, lives are renewed, one's body pauses and allows the soul to catch up. Meeting these guests with the highest standards of hospitality and the humble spirit of welcoming, the Center is indeed Holy Ground for those who come."

Sound too good to be true? Perhaps, one might think. But they would be wrong. Come visit us. Partake of Omega's hospitality. Share a Friday morning breakfast-welcome with our staff and retreatants. Experience for vourselves. Paul has. And from his perspective, he has seen that Omega is good.

Highlights Through the Years

In 1983, Omega provided facilities for the very first Rainbow Senior Center in Boerne that provided nutritional meals for senior citizens. The Center eventually needed another facility to carry on its mission, and the Sisters stepped forward and allowed use of their gym, an arrangement which lasted for some years.

In the mid-late eighty's, the Sisters hosted summer camps for children at Omega. Bessie and Albert Kronkosky, Jr. always provided funding for the campers' lunches. Sr. Bernadine, (photo top left), teaching sign language to campers.

The first ACTS retreat was held at Omega in 1987. ACTS (Adoration, Community, Theology, and Service) celebrates 30 years this year!

Hilltop Treasures complimented Omega's mission from 1992-2011 by providing a variety of Christian books, materials, and gift items for both retreatants and the general population.


The Outdoor Chapel was completed in 2011 thanks to the generosity of members from St. Francis of Assisi Parish in San Antonio. It provides another space for worship or private reflection

Omega provides space for the annual Health and Wholeness Center's Tea and Sisters' Spaghetti Dinner events, as well as the annual Oblate Retreat.

In addition to providing retreat space for an average of 2,000 guests each year, Omega offers meeting spaces for church and civic groups throughout the week.

Today, Omega remains a sanctuary for people of faith seeking Christ. The center is booked most weekends through 2019.

Boerne Benedictine Sisters Collaborate with Benedictine Volunteers

The Benedictine Sisters of Boerne have teamed up with Benedictine Volunteers, a volunteer organization that was established in 2014 by three Benedictine communities in North and South Dakota. The vision of Benedictine Volunteers is to inspire a spirit of service and discernment by which each volunteer fully realizes the unique call God has placed in her heart, to joyfully animate the world with God's love, compassion, and justice.

"We are excited about this new collaboration with Benedictine Volunteers," said Sr. Bernadine Reyes, OSB. "Our goal is to broaden service opportunities for women, ages 20-55, who may be discerning God's

call in their lives."

Initial volunteer opportunities with the Boerne community will consist of a Texas-Mexico Immersion Program with the Sisters' border ministry, Caridad de Corazón (Charity of the Heart), in Eagle Pass, Texas. Length of service can be from 2 weeks to 2 years. Volunteers will live at the Sisters' mission house and will have opportunities to serve in the areas of building and repairing homes, scholarships distribution, food preparation and distribution, hospitality to service mission groups, liturgy and music, orphanage assistance, photography, prison ministry, soup kitchen assistance and much more.

Advocates for the Immigrant

In true Benedictine spirit, the Sisters of Boerne have long been advocates for social justice and corporate responsibility. Issues including human rights, human trafficking, energy and environment, health care and health care reform, U.S./Mexico concerns, predatory lending practices and fair pay concerns have remained priorities, especially for Sister Susan Mika, OSB.

Sister Susan and Ruben Lopez, both with the Benedictine Coalition for Responsible Investment (CRI), faithfully attend monthly Interfaith Welcome Coalition immigration meetings in San Antonio. Through strategies and networking, they focus on the plight of undocumented immigrant women and children in South Texas detainment centers. The coalition's member groups provide

hands-on support of at-risk immigrant communities, as well as advocacy on legislative agendas. Sr. Susan and Ruben create monthly immigration updates outlining proposed legislation, outcomes of ongoing judicial review at the national and local levels, and article summaries that document what is happening. In the past, Sisters Bernadine Reyes, OSB (Prioress) and Frances Briseño, OSB have offered their presence among immigrant women and children at one of the south Texas detainment centers.

Border Ministry Receives Help From Benefactors for Student Scholarships

Our US/Mexico border ministry, Caridad de Corazón, has scholarship fund to help students in Piedras Negras continue their education after grade school. In Mexico, parents have to pay for continuing education into Secondaria (Junior High) Prepa (High School). It is difficult for parents who work for minimal wages to provide an education for their children.

With an education, these children have a greater chance at a better future. Keeping them in school will also help to prevent them from becoming an easy pick for running or using drugs.

All the students are eager to continue their studies and were especially pleased when we provided them supplies such as back packs, pens, reams of paper, and spiral notebooks.

If you would like to help a student continue their education, please call 830.816.8504. This year we are sponsoring 38 students. Their tuition varies by grade, school or university they attend. Below is a list of usual charges for their studies:

- Secondaria (Junior High) is \$30 a year and if a uniform, shoes, school supplies or computers are needed, we assist with these as we are able.
- Prepa (High School) may vary from \$80.00 to \$150.00 twice a year.
- Universidad (College) tuition may range from \$125.00 a month to \$500.00 depending on interest or major.

Three students graduated this year: one is a nurse, one is a psychology major, and the third is going to be a lawyer. Thank you to all who make these sponsorships possible!
